
my Schumer is everything right now.
Of course, there's a small chance
you might not have heard of her yet,
but there's an even bigger chance
you're about to love her just as
much as Lena Dunham, Mindy
Kaling, Tina Fey, Amy Poehler and co.

She's been slaying it on the US stand-up comedy scene since 2007 – and it's Amy's brand of brassy, ballsy confidence and acerbic, en pointe pick-aparts of female experiences, gender inequality and human behaviour that has cemented her status as comedy's Next Big Thing. Her career kicked up a notch thanks to *Inside Amy Schumer*, the sketch show she co-created, exec-produces, writes for and stars in. The show became an Emmy-nominated ratings triumph soon after its 2013 debut, not to mention a viral sensation shared on millions of Facebook timelines everywhere.

But Amy's defining moment is happening this year and we're glad to be in the front seat. In April, she hosted the MTV Movie Awards (and totally smashed it) and this month her first feature film, *Trainwreck* (your new *Bridesmaids*esque quotable obsession), hits cinemas.

The movie, which Amy wrote and stars in, follows the exploits of a writer who enjoys a commitment-free life (read: one night stands on the reg). That is, until she meets charming doctor Aaron Conners (Bill Hader) who sends her "monogamy is not realistic" mantra spinning.

It's not even out yet and the flick has been a hit with audiences and critics at previews across the globe. If the hype leads to bums on cinema seats, it will place Schumer in the same league as box-office-busting big guns like Kristen Wiig and Melissa McCarthy. And perhaps best of all, she's a "I don't take no shit from anybody" feminist. She says, "I didn't mean to become a beacon of feminism, but I'm really embracing it. I'm an unflinching feminist so it makes sense to me. It's the cause I'm most interested in helping." So, how does it feel to be on the cusp of worldwide renown not only for your craft but as a crusader for equal rights?



WHAT WOULD YOU SAY IS THE BEST THING ABOUT BEING FAMOUS? "I think I've been famous for, like, months. So I don't know yet. One time, somebody gave my table free appetisers at a restaurant. I couldn't eat them because cheese makes me fart, but everyone at the table was really impressed."

WHY DO YOU THINK EVERYONE IS TALKING ABOUT FEMINISM AGAIN? "I think there's been a real surge because younger starlets – well, in America anyway – have said that they aren't. There have been some who've said, 'I'm not a feminist' but I truly believe they don't know what it means because that's crazy. Like, what ancient, archaic weirdos are walking around thinking that we all shouldn't be equal?"

HOW AUTOBIOGRAPHICAL WOULD YOU SAY *TRAINWRECK* IS? "It's 50 per cent autobiographical."

APATOW. HOW DID YOU GUYS COME TO WORK TOGETHER?
"He heard me on Howard Stern [radio show]. He wanted to meet and we just hit it off. He was like, 'If you ever have an idea, let me know,' and I was like, 'Yeah, I have an idea.' So I wrote a movie and he was like, 'Why don't you write a really personal one?' And

BILL HADER IS YOUR CO-STAR. DID YOU HAVE A HAND IN CASTING HIM? "Judd was Bill's champion. I'd never met Bill before but once he auditioned, I was like, 'Oh my God, there is no-one else who can play this role.' He was so perfect."

IT'S BEEN SAID YOUR CHARACTER HAS AN ACT-LIKE-A-MAN ATTITUDE. WHAT DO YOU THINK ABOUT THAT? "That's not been my experience at all. This is how I am and how a lot of girls are where the guy ends up being a little more sensitive and emotionally invested."

IF YOU WERE ASKED TO DESCRIBE YOURSELF, WHAT WOULD YOU SAY? "Let's think... Fearless. Funny and... evolving." ▶

DID YOU FIND IT MUCH OF A JUMP TO GO FROM INSIDE AMY SCHUMER INTO MOVIES? "I'm a little bit of a commitment-phobe, so to know I was shooting for 50-plus days was different; the show shoots for 30. And to play the same character... I really liked it. I like Bill.

YOU'VE BEEN CALLED A TRAILBLAZER. WHAT DOES THAT WORD MEAN TO YOU?

"I'm just making observations and being honest about them and myself. It'll be cool when people called 'trailblazers' would be more the norm. It's a huge compliment but also makes me feel like we have work to do."

IF YOU WERE WRITING THIS STORY FOR A MAGAZINE, WHAT WOULD YOU WANT IT TO SAY?

"That I was born with the perfect pussy. [Laughs] No, I would want it to say... Tilda Swinton wrote a poem about me for TIME's 100 Most Influential People and I loved what she wrote, so I'd probably quote her because it's too embarrassing to talk about yourself."

WHO ARE YOUR INSPIRATIONS IN LIFE?

"Caitlyn Jenner. Gloria Steinem. Leesa Evans - she did the wardrobe on *Trainwreck*. People who are great at what they do, love it and do it for the right reasons. And, Miss Piggy."

YOU'RE SELF-DEPRECATING IN YOUR STAND-UP GIGS - DO YOU FEEL THAT YOU HAVE TO BE? "It comes naturally. I was at an awards show last night, I got an award and like, I'm eating my lamb, looking at Rose Whitley, Huntington-Whitestorm [Rosie Huntington-Whiteley] and I'm like, 'What?' It just happens."

HOW DO YOU FEEL WHEN YOU'RE ON STAGE? "Powerful"

"Amy's IS IT WEIRD WITH SO MANY PEOPLE WATCHING? "Right now, I'm doing theatres and it's usually got your back. a couple thousand people. The energy is amazing. I look out and I think, 'They're here to see me,' and I know I've brought material that's going to make them laugh. I say my first joke and I get that first laugh. I feel good." HOW DO YOU FEEL ABOUT THE SUCCESS OF YOUR EMMY-NOMINATED SHOW?

"Very surprised and elated! They didn't think it was going to work on that network [Comedy Central]. It was a super male-dominated, male demographic network."

SHOW, LIKE TINA FEY. IS THERE ANYONE WHO YOU WANTED THAT YOU COULDN'T GET? "Daniel Day Lewis said no - I don't know why. Nah, I'm just kidding. More people are willing to do the show now. I think it's all thanks to Paul Giamatti - he was the first person."
